#### Greetings in Christ!

Last year I began my September Newsletter article with the following words:

We are now almost 6 full months into this new reality of living in a COVID world in the year of 2020. We are experiencing life in new and unprecedented ways like no other time in our living memories or our world history. We are in a moment, a new time to perhaps consider so much about our past, present and future.

This moment is now, and the future of the church is wide open.

Autumn is, above all else, even in in a normal world, a time of change. It is also a time of new beginnings. As this fall begins, our calling is the same as it has been in the past; to experience and hear God's voice, to practice the presence of God, to become closer to God and to follow God on God's mission to bless and heal our world. God has not stopped speaking and calling us even if we are limited in our gatherings and movements in our lives.

Today, in September of 2021, now almost eighteen months of continuing to live in a Covid world I am thinking more about the future of our ministry together as two congregations under one umbrella. I have been thinking a lot about the word "Ubuntu" and what it means as we navigate our world, the pandemic, and our life as a missional outpost in Monroe.

Ubuntu is a term meaning "humanity". It is sometimes translated as "I am because we are." This word is an ancient African philosophy to remind us and the world that we are shaped by our relationships with others. It's a way of living that begins with the premise that *"I am" only because we are.* In practice, ubuntu means believing the common bonds within a group are more important than any individual arguments and divisions within it. "People will debate, people will disagree; yet it is about coming together and building a consensus around what affects the community."

When we come back into our building to worship together, we will continue to look forward into our future and seek God's preferred future for us under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. We will do so by remembering where we were in our conversations as separate congregations working to discern our possible future together under one umbrella or under the fabric of a large tent. This conversation will begin to move forward again around the question of what it might look like to be one ministry with a new identity united in grace, while still maintaining our denominational identities and heritage. This new identity might even be called "United in Grace' or "Grace United" <u>A joint ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America</u> and the United Methodist Church. Perhaps a topic for a later conversation?

During this COVID time both congregational councils have discussed and approved jointly working together in the following ways:

\*Joint Worship \*Joint Staffing - including jointly paying Jills, Custodians, Kathi's to an extent, and Bryce's salary's \*Joint Newsletter - "Growing in Grace" \*Joint Website - MSLC has already dropped its old website- https://www.unitedingrace.org/

\* Sharing cost of worship computer and other expenses

As I looked back, in an effort to more fully understand what the future conversation might look like, I thought that it would be helpful to remind us as to the work that began after I was appointed as the pastor of Monroe United Methodist church on July 1, 2019.

By July 11<sup>th</sup>, 2019, the Council leaders (Missy Maxson- Morning Star Lutheran & Nancy Franke- Monroe United Methodist) in an email conversation began having a dialogue as to what the Holy Spirit might be leading us jointly into.

*They both expressed the sense that* the Holy Spirit has been leading us down an obvious road to merging in some way and to grasp and understand that we will definitely be stronger together. They also understood, as do I, that the road may not be easy, but it does mean we will need to stay positive, communicate clearly, and keep praying.

<u>September 8<sup>th</sup></u> – Rally Sunday -Nancy attended the MSLC service and Missy attended the MUMC service. Both sharing the other's desire to start the conversation about joining forces and to announce the prayer vigil.

September- and October - Volunteers were sought by both councils to be on a Joint Ministry Leadership Team.

<u>September 28<sup>th</sup> - 29<sup>th</sup> -</u> 24 Hour Prayer Vigil from 9:30am Saturday Sept. 28 to 9:30am Sunday took place followed by a joint service with a joint meeting after the service to lay out ideas and have Q&A and ask for all members to discern if they feel called to serve on JMLT.

**December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019-** Monroe United Methodist Church at its Annual Congregational Charge Conference Meeting confirmed by vote to affirm their desire by a majority vote to continue to look into, explore, and move forward with a plan to join both congregations into one while still maintaining their United Methodist memberships and affiliations.

**December 8<sup>th</sup>, 2019**-Morning Star Lutheran Church at its Administrative Congregational meeting after much discussion, many questions and concerns, confirmed by a majority vote to also continue to explore joining our ministry with Monroe United Methodist Church.

December 2020- March 2021- We worshiped together during Advent and Christmas Eve.

March 8<sup>th,</sup> -We had our last in-person joint worship service.

March 13<sup>th</sup>- All in person worship was halted due to the pandemic.

<u>March 29<sup>th</sup></u> – We began the first of joint on-line worship services. As of this newsletter we have now 78 services recorded on YouTube.

I believe and am convinced that God is still speaking and has given us all that we need, the people and resources, to partner with God in God's mission for Monroe and for our world. The future comes to us as a gift from God and will be revealed to us if we but listen and follow. God invites us to listen, to think creatively with the Holy Spirit, and to dream about the unimaginable possibilities which God has planned for us. So, we ask: *Who* God has called us to be and to *What* God has called us to do in this time right now and in this place right now.

This may indeed lead us into new ways of being and doing. We will be invited by the Holy Spirit to do things we have not done before, don't know how to do, and possibly to do things we may not even want to do. We are being invited to follow God into our world and to join in with what God is already doing. We rest in hope because we know that endings with God are new beginnings.

#### In my June Pastors report I made the following proposal for the Formation of Joint Guiding Team.

My proposal is that we set up a 'Guiding Team' made up of representatives from both congregations (perhaps 1 or 2 people and perhaps one from the council), and myself as a pastoral and spiritual guide. This team would set a timeline, process, short - and long-term goals in order to discern whether or not to intentionally move forward with this this collaborative venture. We would create listening meetings, and groups within the congregations as we discern this possible work. This will be a process that will take as much time as is needed until the Guiding Team believes it has enough information to make a recommendation to both churches' councils and congregations.

It has become very clear to me that we need to be working more closely together interdependently and not independently. I have always believed that we are always better together embracing 'Ubuntu'' - *I am because we are*.

We thank God for each of you and for your love and grace as we walk this new journey together in this new and unprecedented time in history, following and discovering Christ in our midst and in our world.

From the Spirit, September 2021

On August 1, 2021 I began my third year in the office of bishop for the Northwest Washington Synod. It is my pleasure and joy to serve God and to journey with you through this office. I am thankful for your partnership, your understanding, your

forgiveness, your passion, and your faithfulness.

We are living in a time of great turmoil and great opportunity. We are living in (to use a much-overused word) unprecedented times. What does this mean for us as individuals? The Northwest Washington Synod? The ELCA? The Body of Christ?

Many of us feel **grief**. Grief at what once was but is no longer. Grief that the world keeps changing around us and we cannot figure out our place or our sense of call in the middle of so much shifting. It is difficult when the world feels rocky and unsteady. It is hard to understand that what we often took for granted is no longer. Recently I visited my hometown in eastern Washington. The town is half the size it was when I was growing up. As I walked through the downtown, businesses that have been there for decades are gone. Boarded up. Abandoned. My world felt rocked. And I grieved. What do you grieve?

Many of us feel **anger or resentment**. We divide ourselves into camps. We use the words, "us" and "them" and act as though "our" camp is always right and holy and just. We throw words around like weapons and we refuse to truly listen to the other – because we are "right" and they are "wrong." And nothing will persuade us otherwise. In John 8 we hear Jesus tell the men who wanted to throw rocks at a woman accused of adultery, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' When the men leave, Jesus says to the woman, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again." What would it mean for us to live into these words of Jesus?

Many of us feel **exhausted**. We are tired. We are weary. For a brief moment it felt as thought we were moving beyond COVID19 and then suddenly, with the Delta variant, we were pushed back into worry and concern (I am writing this in the middle of August – perhaps the numbers will be better before you read this in September!). Quite frankly, I am tired of changing things on the calendar – wondering if something should be in-person or online, wondering if I am doing something risky or if I am not taking the variables into enough consideration. It is wearisome. What makes you exhausted?

Many of us feel there is **something more that we are missing**. We ache for connection with God and with others. We feel lonely when we are alone, and we feel even more isolated when we are in a group. We long for meaning. We yearn to truly live, move, and have our being in the Spirit (Acts 17). How does the community of Christ answer the loneliness so many are feeling? What have we missed in the life of the church and participants? How do we sink even more deeply into the waters of life that God has called us to and given us in our baptisms?

Many of us are **hopeful**. Yes, I fully am living in the reality of all that I said above. I am not a Pollyanna. And yet, I trust that God is here, God is present, God is active – in this beautiful, flawed world of ours. Right now, in our congregations and in our neighborhoods, there are griefstricken, angry, exhausted, aching-for-connection people. And right now, God has given us the opportunity to not only reach out to these people, but to listen and reflect, grow and learn together. What a calling! What an opportunity!

# **SECURITY IN THE CHURCH BUILDINGS**

Two weeks ago while conducting his nightly security check, our caretaker Jerry found the side door of the church left not only unlocked, but open, right next to the Little Free Pantry. Unfortunately, this is far from the first time a door has been left open or unlocked when he checked.

We know that many of you have keys to the church, and many more know the code to the lockbox, so its hard to say who might have entered and left the door open. It goes without saying that this this is a big security risk, not only for things being stolen, but for someone to enter the church unauthorized, which could be a danger for anyone else going in.

We ask that if you have a key to the church, OR use the code to the lock box to get into either the church or the annex, that you be very vigilant in remembering to check ALL doors when you leave (especially of you enter by one door and leave by another) to make sure the buildings are kept safe and secure.

Right now it is a mass of weeds and very overgrown plants. This project will be headed up by Peggy Ray with Ric Hart and Jerry providing some labor, but could certainly use some help form both congregations to get this done. Usually Don and Chris Hoerner have tended to the Prayer Garden almost exclusively, but as you know Don has had 9 surgeries (the latest one on 8/26 for a fractured femur after the hip replacements on 8/24) since February and been in a rehab center for the past few months until the actual hip replacement could be done. Chris says this latest surgery will keep him in Bethany Rehab for a while still. We are all filling in as best we can for trustee chairs Don and Chris, and thank all that have stepped up to help with property issues. Our prayers go out to Don for swift healing and to Chris for patience and endurance!
